## conservation research

Camperdown Wildlife Centre, along with other zoos, has a very close relationship with science. Animals are often extremely elusive and threatened in the wild and applied research takes advantage of significant opportunities to study factors important to conservation.

Workingwithourstaff, zoological institutions and external collaborators, we continue to build a positive reputation in the areas of an imal husbandry, behaviour and wild life research. The contributions aim to enhance the understanding and conservation of the animal species in our care and in the wild.

We take advantage of our invaluable opportunities to explore, conduct and facilitate research opportunities within ex-situ and in-situ settings to contribute to the advances in the scientific knowledge of animals.

Asweperformresearchinvestigations, whether observational, behavioural or field projects, we will have clear scientific purposes with reasonable expectations to increase the understanding of our subjects.

Wefurtherfulfilthese objectives and responsibilities by providing results that benefit the conservation, health, welfare and environments of our studied animals openly to the zoo community and wider audiences.





## conservation breeding

Conservation breeding is an extremely important function of modern zoos and aquariums. The effective management of captive populations in zoos can ultimately lead to the re-introduction of a species that is threatened or extinct in the wild.

Camperdown Wildlife Centre will continue to contribute to breeding programmes as part of joint conservation initiatives. These animals in our care are monitored by species coordinators and studbook keepers at regional, European or global levels.

We will maintain our institutional collection plant or effect the coordinated approaches of our professional community to ensure that our efforts contribute to the effectiveness of species conservation worldwide.
